Distance Learning Courses

Although our primary focus is on classroom courses, which offer the opportunity for face-to-face interaction and spiritual formation, we continue to extend our reach through Distance Learning courses. A recent improvement in technology has enabled us to provide DVD courses in a format that will play back on either a TV-DVD or a PC-DVD (Mac is supported only if PC-compatible). Eleven courses (listed below) are now offered in this format, while *Patristics* and *Old Testament Poetical Books* are still offered in CD format.

These courses may be taken for credit at a cost of \$450 or audited for \$150. One practical application for the courses is to use them for a study group for a parish Sunday School or weekday Bible class.
